Kia ora whanau, welcome to our April newsletter and the last day of Term 1. It has been a very busy, yet disjointed term with a number of interruptions. We have had our usual run of Term 1 activities, such as camps, retreats, sports days and the like. Throw in Easter during term time and unexpected school closure due to water crisis and extreme weather and it all adds up to a fairly hectic time, with not as much time as we would like getting on with great teaching and learning. We look forward to Term 2 with many more weeks of uninterrupted opportunities for students to connect with their learning. At assembly this Monday I challenged students to take personal responsibility for ensuring the completion of their classwork. ### **Catholic Chapter**

#### "Christ is Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia!" "Kua ara te Karaiti, Areruia, Areruia!"

The final weeks of Lent have been very busy at the College, culminating in Holy Week and our celebration of the *Triduum* – the three days in the Church's calendar which together express the central mystery of our Christian faith: the death and resurrection of Jesus. Of all the Church's celebrations throughout the year, the Easter Triduum is considered the highpoint.

At Sacred Heart, we celebrate the *Triduum* with three separate liturgies, led by our senior students. On Tuesday morning at 10am in the Event Centre we remembered Jesus' call to serve others in our "Washing of the Feet" liturgy. We listened to the words from John 15:13, *"I have set an example for you, so that you will do just what I have done for you."* 

At 2.30pm on Thursday, before leaving school for the Easter break, our senior students led us in the Stations of the Cross, reflecting on the sacrifice Jesus made for us and the sacrifices we are called to make to follow him. Through Jesus' death we can be saved from sin and live in hope of the day we too will join God in heaven.

On returning to school on Wednesday April 4, we celebrated the joy of the resurrection, Christ's victory over sin and death and we recalled our Lenten promise to "find Jesus in the face of others, in their voices and in their pleas." The Resurrection was not seen by anybody. According to the Gospel stories, the first anyone knew about it was when the women went on the Sunday morning to the tomb. An angel was waiting for them and told them that Jesus had risen.

We are a resurrection people. Let us continue to think about how we can bring the Light of Christ to others.

### Uniform

A reminder about uniform: Next term students should be in their winter uniform which includes black shoes and stockings.

Hoodies and such (even those with SHGC logos) are **NOT** part of our school uniform and should not be worn to school. If your daughter feels the cold a long sleeve undergarment can be worn under her blouse but must remain unseen.

Jackets might be needed when it is cold. These are to be removed in the classroom so a jersey is still required. It is sensible to bring some form of rain protection next term.

Please name all uniform items so that they can be returned to their owners promptly.

#### Junior Students (Years 7—10)

White overblouse Tartan skirt—mid knee length Jersey Black polishable shoes (maximum heel height 4cm) with black tights or white ankle socks Senior Students (Years 11—13) Overblouse—compulsory (Formal dress uniform) Navy blue skirt Jersey Blazer—optional for Year 11 students Black polishable shoes (maximum heel height 4cm) with black tights or white ankle socks

All uniform items are available from Campus Clothing on Gill Street.

### **Attendance**

Student attendance, along with effective teaching, has the greatest influence on student engagement and achievement. All students must be present at school so they can participate and engage in learning. Parents and boards of trustees are legally responsible to ensure students' regular attendance at school.

## A 90% attendance rate means a student misses five school days each term, or one day a fortnight, or the equivalent of one year of school over 10 years.

With winter months ahead, sickness will become an issue. If your daughter is sick, please keep her at home but please encourage her to be at school at all other times. Taking time away from school for holidays or other events needs careful consideration as it can make it difficult for our young people to keep on top of their commitments. They will need you to guide them to make the best decision for their learning.

Thank you for your ongoing co-operation with our attendance system. Communicating with us is very helpful. We are keeping careful track of all student's attendance rates. If your daughter's attendance rate falls below 85%, her dean will be in touch with you. You can keep track of your daughter's attendance by logging into the school portal on the school's website. It is found under "attendance" in the details tab.

We are here to help make your daughter's experience of school a positive and successful one. We are committed to this and want to work with you to achieve success for your daughter. If you would like to talk to anyone about any concerns, the first point of call would be your daughter's Homeroom teacher or her GEMs teacher.

### **NCEA Matters**

The NCEA fees have been added to school accounts. The amount is set at \$76.70. You can pay the fees via internet banking or at the school office. Financial assistance is available to assist with the payment of entry fees for National Secondary Schools gualifications.

Who can apply for financial assistance? To be eligible to apply you must be the fee-payer and meet at least one of the following criteria:

• be currently receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit, or have a current Community Services Card (benefit-based applications)

• are not currently receiving a benefit, or do not have a current Community Services Card, but do have a joint family income that would entitle you to receive a Community Services Card (income based applications)

• have two or more children who are candidates, irrespective of family income, and the total fees you would have to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum (multiple candidate applications). Go to the <u>NZQA website</u> to find out more.

# The many aliases of Craig




We were contacted by a student who wanted to recognise Craig as a 'Good Sort' - so here he is and here is what the student had to say:
