School donations claims to IRD

Families are entitled to claim their school donations each year. It has come to our attention that some of our community have received letters from IRD stating that some of our school donations don't qualify and have been removed from the total claim. Some families, on the other hand, have been paid out 100% of their donations. To our knowledge, this is the first year this has happened and we are working with IRD to find out why there is inconsistency with this year's tax refunds.

As per the *Ministry of Education Circular 20113/06 Payments by parents of students* that all Board of Trustees of state and state-integrated schools are required to abide by notes that *Board of Trustees and Proprietors are able to request donations and may suggest an amount for a general or specified donation. It also notes that we should inform parents that these qualify for an income tax credit from Inland Revenue in relation to donations made to the school.*

The Board of Trustees have classed our donations correctly as per the above Ministry of Education rules. If you have received a letter stating that some donations have not been paid then please ring the school office or email Maree Sutton <u>msu@shgcnp.school.nz</u> or Liz Goldsworthy <u>accounts@shgcnp.school.nz</u>. With your permission, we can then forward your contact details on to the local IRD office who have agreed to look into anyone who is having issues on any unpaid school donations.

Use of devices at school

At Sacred Heart Girls' College, we operate a high trust model when it comes to the use of devices. We believe that restricting or blocking access is counterproductive and instead focus on educating the community about safe appropriate use of devices. At the GEMs interviews in Term 1, we provided families with a booklet on the expectations of using devices and some links to presentations on screen time and online safety. You can find these on our school website and we encourage you to do so.

Currently, we believe that every student from Year 7 – 9 has access to a device for her learning. This is either via school-provided Surface tablets, classroom PC's or BYOD. We are in the process of distributing devices to students at Year 10 who need them. Senior students, who do not have their own device, are able to borrow laptops from the library for use in class. This enables your daughter to access a wide variety of learning opportunities, however, it also brings with it some responsibilities on your daughter's part.

During school time, it is expected that your daughter uses her device for learning. This means respecting the boundaries put in place by each subject teacher. These will differ based on the teacher, course content and type of lesson that has been planned. If your daughter is unsure of what is appropriate use of her device in a given class, she should speak to her teacher.

During instruction time, when the teacher is speaking, it is expected that earphones are removed, laptop screens are lowered and phones are off or in 'Do not Disturb' mode. This ensures that there can be no confusion about your daughter's attention and engagement in the lesson. Social media and online streaming sites should not be used during class time unless specifically requested by the teacher.


During school time, if you need to contact your daughter, **please do so via the office or wait until lunchtime**. Texting or ringing your daughter directly can be disruptive to the class and their learning.

We have filters in place to keep students safe online at school. There has, however, been some discussion amongst students lately about the use of VPN's to bypass filters and this causes concern.

VPN stands for Virtual Private Network. It is used to connect your device to another company's network via the internet. If a VPN is used, the school can no longer guarantee the safety of your internet searches or your data. There are a lot of risks when passing your data through someone else's network. <u>https://restoreprivacy.com/free</u>-<u>vpns/</u> is a very good article that highlights those risks. Examples of VPN risks include:

- Third party access to your data, including fraud, where your personal data is given to third parties without your knowledge.
- Stolen bandwidth and
- Browser hijacking which will direct you to partner sites without your permission.

WAR IN GALLIPOLI

ANZACS - Australia, New Zealand Army Corps. This was the name of those who fought for our country in war. ANZACs fought for many days many nights and many years. But only in their second year of war was when they went to Gallipoli. ANZAC day commemorates the day that the ANZACs landed in Gallipoli. It is where a lot of soldiers died while fighting in that long war that seemed to last a lifetime.

Before the war - The day leading up to men leaving New Zealand to fight was filled with intrepidation. The soon to be soldiers eager, looking for an adventure. The parents having the fear that they won't see the children again. For many, lying about their age was easy, they didn't see the point in an age limit, they only felt the enticement of being able to travel and have an experience like no other, but not know the harsh future of it all. It was anything from a great adventure, it was a sacrifice and they hadn't yet learnt the danger of it.

The children – started on the 19th of February in 1915 when the ANZACs landed in what's now known as -ANZAC cove. For the soldiers the days were full of dread. For the mothers, sons, uncles and grandparents days full of fear that there would come a day where they would get the letter that could mean its all over. But for the children the days full of learning, but the learning of the good side of war. When the children got to school they started with a flag raising ceremony to acknowledge the soldiers before they could go into the classroom, then for the rest of the day. Making packages, learning military like skills and reading journals about what was happening. And sadly the children only learnt about the good things happening and not about the more than 130,000 soldiers that died while fighting.

The battle of Gallipoli – it was a revolting sight, a pile of those that have not survived, a bulging tent of the sick and injured, blood covered ground and soldiers with guns for miles. The battle went on for 8 long months. For soldiers always a fear of getting blown up by shells or getting shot or in some cases being blown up while digging a trench, but they wouldn't show their fear, they all stayed strong for their family.

I have learnt to be more thankful of what I have and what I am able to do because if there was a war, including my country, I would be terribly scared and I would be worried for my life and the life of others. I don't think that the damage caused by the war, the land ruined, animals killed and families destroyed by lies, sickness and death. The aftermath continued to hurt the few soldiers who managed to return home.
