Kia ora whanau

Welcome to our Spring newsletter. The milder weather in recent days has lured our spring bulbs into revealing their hopeful faces, and the show outside our chapel is magnificent. We have been making some improvements to our grounds, not only to physically enhance the environment, but also in response to safety concerns. As such, visibility at the front entrance of the college has been improved, and we are working on making the walkway behind the school, along the railway tracks, much safer to traverse. Thank you for your patience whilst these works are underway. Caregivers, please assist us in keeping our site safe for pedestrians before and after school by not driving onto the school grounds. Dropoff and collection on Paynters Ave and Waiwaka Terrace only please.

You may be aware that the filters on our school network have changed because of a security upgrade this Wednesday afternoon. Because of this, many students chose to download free VPNs in order to bypass these filters. This presents massive risk to the users. We put the following notice on the school Facebook page to bring your attention to the dangers of these, and communicated directly with students:

"Our school network provider, N4L, made changes to our network security and filter systems and this has caused many social media sites to be blocked at school. As a result, students have been downloading free VPNs onto their phones to bypass the new filters and access these sites. VPN stands for Virtual Private Network. It is used to connect your device to another company's network via the internet. There are a lot of risks when passing your data through someone else's network including third party access to your data, stolen bandwidth, browser hijacking and fraud. If a VPN is used, the school can no longer guarantee the safety of your internet searches or your data".

Further to this, both students and parents signed Student Responsible Use Agreements at the beginning of the year in order to gain permission to access to the school Wi-Fi. In signing this, you agreed "that the schools network filters will be applied to my connection to the internet and attempts will not be made to bypass them" and said that "I

understand that if I breach this Responsible Use Agreement, I may lose access to school ICT services including the use of the internet, on school owned devices or any personally owned device used at school." You can find the agreement in full here. We are currently reviewing access to some sites, particularly those lacking in educational benefit.

We are planning an exciting new collaborate teaching and learning approach mid-way through Term 4 for students in Years 7-10. This curriculum trial will see teachers from different curriculum areas co-design new and engaging units of work around authentic and interesting topics. Students will choose three collaborations to engage with for two weeks, and then move to three more collaborations for the following two weeks. Further detail will be provided later in the term, including a list of the collaborations for students to make their selections from. Every student will need to have a least one choice with a Literacy focus, one with a Numeracy focus and one with a Special Catholic Character focus in order to meet minimum curriculum requirements. Please note, this is a collaborative teaching trial phase only and will not impact on curriculum nor subject selection in 2019. Further future changes to curriculum will not be considered until we have adequately reviewed the trial, and we will seek student and caregiver voice in such.

All the very best to students, staff and volunteers who are representing Sacred Heart Girls' College at Tournament Week next week and AIMS Games the week after. I have spoken to all competitors, wishing them well, encouraging them to play hard and to play fair, and reminded them that they remain 'Sacred Heart Girls' in their demeanour and actions both on and off the sports fields, courts and pitches. Remembering and acknowledging the time, effort and expense that others' have invested in providing our students with such opportunities is important. Thank you, and good luck!

Senior students, supported by our teachers, are preparing for practice examinations to be held throughout weeks 8 and 9. Students must take these examinations seriously. Too often students are relying on grades from practice examinations should circumstances out of their control affect their abilities come externals; it does happen. Fully preparing oneself for practice examinations will also allow for students and teachers to gain a clear picture around where learning is at. This is an opportunity to benchmark performance so you can properly gauge where further consolidation of learning needs to occur.

The poll closes at noon on Friday 21 September 2018.




The Year of the Korowai



Note from Mr Murray

Practice exams for NCEA candidates will be held in Week 8 and 9 (Thursday 13th September—Wednesday 19th September). These exams should be treated with the utmost importance as the results from the exams can be used for Derived Grades and practice for the use of Special Assessment Conditions.

A Derived Grade is a grade reported by a school based on preexisting evidence.

Students can apply for a derived grade if:

- they believe their preparation for, or performance in, an external exam was impaired,
- they were unable to sit an exam for reasons beyond their control.

Please take the time to talk to your daughter about preparing for the exams. Feel free to contact myself or your daughter's teachers for further support. Support her to prepare a study timetable with allocated slots for study each day.

Watches in examinations

There has been a change to the external examination rules in 2018. Candidates' watches brought into an NZQA administered examination must be placed in an emergency evacuation pack under the candidate's chair. Situations in which candidates fail to do this will be treated as a possible breach of the external examination rules. The decision not to allow candidates to have watches in examination rooms has arisen because of the difficulties faced by examination supervisors in determining whether a candidate's watch is digital or analogue. Many digital watches resemble traditional analogue watches, and supervisors do not have time at the start of an examination to determine what type of watch it is.

NZQA is concerned that some digital watches have transmitting functions and may send and receive emails. They can also be used to store information and can be linked to hearing devices. As outlined in the Candidate Information Sheet for the NZQA examinations, you are not allowed to bring the following into the examination room:

- any electronic device not required for a digital examination unless it is switched off and inside the emergency evacuation pack;
- an electronic device is anything that can store, communicate and/or retrieve information. Candidates will not be disadvantaged by this rule as clocks are displayed in all our examination rooms and supervisors indicate on a whiteboard how much time is left in an examination, in 15-minute segments.

Candidates who have SAC entitlement using computers in examinations have a clock available on the screen. To familiarize students with this new examination rule, NZQA has suggested schools apply the same procedure to practice examinations.

We will be applying this rule to the practice examinations scheduled this term.

Watches brought into the examination room must be placed in a pack (a clear ziplock bag) under the candidate's chair. This is the responsibility of the student. If you have further questions regarding this issue please see Mr Murray or Ms Goodey.

Year 7 and 8 GEMS Conferences

As teachers will be involved with interviews during these two days, normal classes will be cancelled. If possible, we ask that you make alternative care arrangements for your daughter for these two days. If you find this difficult, please communicate with your daughter's homeroom teacher so that we can ensure that suitable care can be arranged for her at school.

Processes/Pastoral/Wellbeing

Planned Leave Process

Planned student leave is generally known well in advance of the absence and usually lasts for 3 or more days. This usually involves sporting commitments or family holidays during term time.

Thank you for contacting your daughter's Dean via email if you know that your daughter will be absent in this planned way.

All other absences such as sickness, appointments, dance exams etc should use our normal absence phone line. Thank you for your help with this.

Pastoral Care Survey






