## Principal's Peace



Kia ora whanau

Welcome to our April newsletter, and to the last week of Term 1, ahead of Holy Week. As Catholics, and as Christians, Holy Week is the most poignant of the liturgical year. Our weeks of Lent have led us to the time where we share in the tradition that is remembering Jesus's passion; where the greatest of all sacrifices was made by our saviour.

The college has been engaged in a number of events throughout the course of this week that remind us to consider the mysterious series of events that led to the death and resurrection of Jesus. Our participation in these liturgies has allowed each one of us to be open to God's great plan, and to consider whether we are living witness to Jesus, in growing into the person that we have been created to become.

Our Washing of the Feet liturgy reminded us that Jesus was the servant of others. In Jesus washing the feet of his apostles, he demonstrated the most extreme form of humility and love for man and this love resulted in the ultimate sacrifice of His life for us on the cross.

As the followers of Jesus, we are asked to follow Christ, to humble ourselves, to wash the feet of others, especially those under our care. Our nation has had to dig deep in recent weeks, and has humbled itself in the face of terror following the acts of one extremist. We responded to terror with love, with acceptance of diversity, and with support for those most in need. The mass outpouring of manaakitanga has been on display for the world to see, as a shining example of the very best of humanity.



Gabby Devine is 'our angel'. Angel Gabrielle had a very short life here on earth, just 13 years. Gabby's life as a Sacred Heart student in Year 7 and 8, and the beginning of Year 9, was a torturous one. She suffered from the rare form of bone cancer, Ewings Sarcoma and spent most of that time in Starship Hospital, all the while her body being ravaged by disease. And Gabby's response to immense pain and misfortune? To be kind. To put others' first. To Live the Mission by actively doing Random Acts of Kindness for those in need. Her love and care for others was so great that her legacy lives on. Gabby would have been a member of the Class of 2019. In Gabby's passing, just as with the passing of 50 innocent victims in Christchurch, we have had a light shine on the very best of humanity. Such tragedy and such loss, contributing to illuminating what is great, and what is good. Not so very far removed from the torturous, unjust, yet ultimately great gift that is the death and the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

ANZAC Day this year falls on the second Thursday of the school holidays, and provides a national day to acknowledge our forebears who offered significant, and in some cases, ultimate, sacrifice for us. As is tradition, there will be a Sacred Heart contingent marching at the Dawn Parade on ANZAC Day and we will be laying a wreath as a part of the ceremony. You are welcome to join us. Students are to meet at the clock tower on Devon Street at 5.45am, immaculately dressed in school uniform. I look forward to walking with as many students as possible.



In staffing news, Mr Zwanikken has decided to retire from teaching. Mr Zwanikken will work with us throughout Term 2, before we make necessary changes for Term 3, just as we will be planning for maternity relief cover for Whaea Kerena Wano. I look forward to welcoming students back next term, which will begin with resurrection liturgy, to mark our new beginning. Last year a petition showed that our community was interested in adding shorts and trousers to our school uniform. It is evident that we need to inquire into some further design choices as there was no clear favourite at this point. Most fed back that we need to ensure a formal tailored look and that they should not be a compulsory item and should not form part of our "formal uniform". We will now source a sample pair of the shorts and trousers that appeared most popular and also try to source some other designs before we seek some further feedback.

## Korowai progress

A korowai is made with consideration of the whakapapa and the 'story' of the person for whom it is made.

For korowai Manawa Tapu, and in memory of Diane Kawana, the whakapapa includes strong linkages to the Kawana whanau. Marney, who grew up in and around Hāwera, brought Diane and their young family back to live in Taranaki in 1971, paving the way for Diane's teaching career to start in Hāwera, and to end with her role as Principal of Sacred Heart.

The black swan feathers being woven into the korowai were gifted by Marney's brother, Autry Kawana.

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday, the Sunday leading into Holy Week, when we commemorate the Lord's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The Gospels that describe this event speak of large crowds laying palm branches on the road before Jesus and proclaiming him as king. And yet, before the week is out, he has been betrayed into the hands of his enemies and crucified.

Holy Week culminates with the celebration of the *Triduum* – the three days in the Church's calendar which together express the central mystery of our Christian faith: the death and resurrection of Jesus.

At Sacred Heart, we celebrate the *Triduum* with three separate liturgies, led by our senior students. We remember Jesus's call to serve others in our “Washing of the Feet” liturgy, listening to the words from John 15:13, “*I have set an example for you, so that you will do just what I have done for you.*” Before we leave school for the Easter holidays, our senior students will lead us in the Stations of the Cross, reflecting on the sacrifice Jesus made for us and the sacrifice we are called to make to follow him. On returning to school on Monday April 29, we will celebrate the joy of the resurrection, Christ's victory over sin and death and we will recall our Lenten promise to “find Jesus in the face of others, in their voices and in their pleas.”

We are a resurrection people. Let us think about how we can bring the Light of Christ to others.

Sessions are held after the 5.30pm Mass at St Joseph's. The camp will take place from 26<sup>th</sup>-28<sup>th</sup> April at Vertical Horizons.**

# Nurture Hauora

## From the Ministry of Education

Netsafe has received a number of reports of online content relating to the attacks in Christchurch. Footage of the attacks has been deemed objectionable under New Zealand law which means that possessing or distributing the footage is an offence.



Anyone who finds footage of the attacks online should report it to Netsafe at <https://www.netsafe.org.nz/report/> but they should not keep copies or share it.

Netsafe encourages schools to speak with students about what to do if they come across the footage and about the fact that sharing the footage with this classification is against the law.

The footage of the Christchurch attacks is disturbing and will be harmful for people to see. If students have viewed the video and are struggling with what they have seen, it's likely they will require additional support. Agencies which can provide free support include [Youthline](#), Need to Talk (Free phone or text 1737) and [Kidsline](#) (0800 54 37 54).

While the content is online there is some risk that children or young people may come across it. Netsafe encourages parents to proactively discuss with young people what they should do if they come across distressing content online. ### Online behaviour:

We have increasing incidents of unsavoury online behaviour, including meanness and sharing of photos without consent. Most of these situations occur after school hours and involve our younger girls in years 7-10. Please be aware that there are age restrictions of 13 plus on most social media sites [more info here](#)

We appreciate your ongoing support, as these issues have ongoing consequences at school. Some suggestions:

- Please monitor your daughter's social media accounts by becoming a "friend"
- Please consider some social media rest times and consider eliminating phones and other devices from the bedroom at night.
- Please contact other parents directly if you have a concern resulting from a social media incident. Communicating through your daughter's social media account is seldom helpful.

## Mission Action for Christchurch


A small team was formed that included students and staff to arrange a mission action response to the Christchurch tragedy. They organised a day on Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> March which included a mufti day, bake sale and lunchtime entertainment. Prior to this event the students had the opportunity to write cards to the community of Christchurch to express their sorrow and their love.

We were blessed to have some women from our local Muslim community join us for our lunchtime entertainment. We joined in karakia, waiata and heard a deeply moving poem read by Saba Afzal. We were generously gifted a book from the Taranaki Muslim Association to keep in our library and to strengthen our understanding of the Muslim faith.

We raised \$2200 from this Mission Action. This money has been transferred into supermarket, fuel and taxi vouchers and will be gifted to the Christchurch hospital. The hospital has requested that it be sent straight to the paediatric outpatients clinic as the children of those injured and killed are needing ongoing help and support. The vouchers will be given directly to the mothers of these children. We hope that in some small way we might be helpful to our Muslim brothers and sisters.
