# Principal's Peace



Kia ora whanau, welcome to our August newsletter

This week we hosted the Review and Development team from the Diocese of Palmerston North who conducted an external review of our Special Catholic Character. The review team are responsible for ensuring we are safeguarding our special character, reviewing our Religious Studies curriculum and for auditing our compliance to ensure we are meeting the requirements of our integration agreement.



The review was based around three strands: Encounter with Christ,

Growth and Knowledge, and Christian Witness. Students, teachers and parents spent time with the reviewers answering their questions and providing voice around the experience that is belonging to this faith community. We will be provided with a written review document in due course, however emerging findings look to be most encouraging with the reviewers parting words being "the seeds of faith have been planted here, forming a foundation from which the young women can grow."

Thank you to those caregivers who completed the survey mid-June which was linked to Principal appraisal. It contained targeted questions to help gather voice around what you are looking for in an education for your daughters. This information has been immensely helpful and has contributed to establishing priorities and shaping targeted actions for the benefit of the community we are here to serve. Here's a synthesis of your voice: You want your daughters to be happy, engaged and challenged, achieving their goals and achieving to their potential, have a sense of belonging, are confident, risk-takers, selfmotivated and self-managing. You want us to provide supportive, encouraging teachers who promote excellence, encourage greatness, instil a desire to succeed and have clear expectations. In a curriculum you want core subjects ring-fenced, a refreshed curriculum with timetable flexibility, authentic learning opportunities and diverse experiences, careers and pathways education for all, safe digital learning and increased use of digital learning platforms, within a Catholic context. We are planning subtle changes from next year, including a renewed Y7-9 Technology Curriculum, and a refreshed approach to the way modules work. We will be implementing the new Digital Curriculum across learning areas and will be shifting sexuality and relationship aspect of the Health Curriculum to the Religious Studies faculty.

More information regarding these changes will be shared with you closer to implementation. We have made a conscious decision to not make any curriculum changes from Years 10-13 whilst the consequences of implementation of the NCEA change package remain uncertain at this early stage.

We welcome students and caregivers to Pathways Information Evening this Thursday evening, beginning at 6pm in the Events Centre. This evening will be useful for those students in Years 9-12 who are considering their subject options for 2020. Subject-selection will occur at GEMS Conferences, at the end of this term.

GEMS Jobs and GEMS Themes have been introduced this year with the intention of helping students to consider how their education prepares them for tertiary training, education and employment. GEMS Jobs sessions bring employers in to school to share information about their industry. General education to employment information is shared in GEMS Themes sessions.

On Friday 30 August Year 11 girls will participate in a full day programme looking at their personal attributes and strengths and how these can align with employment opportunities. There will be a visit to Puke Ariki to hear from people in the research and curation field. Guest speakers will present at school and there will be a "next steps" session run by Mr Foy. The Mates and Dates programme is also included in the programme for this day. We look forward to welcoming students and their caregivers to our GEMS conferences at the end of this term.

Our Proprietor, The Mission College New Plymouth Trust Board, has been working with us in better understanding the demands on our buildings and infrastructure, and as such are ready to embark on a staged project to provide additional classrooms, and enhance the quality of existing learning spaces. Stage One of this project will begin this year with four new classrooms being built in a renovation of what is currently an underutilised area of the main block, adjacent to the driveway. This is set to become a new hub for the English faculty and will also contain a new student toilet block. Stage Two is still in planning stages but will eventually comprise of new state of the art Science facilities, which will all be located on one level. Further information around how the building project will affect your daughter will be communicated closer to the time of works beginning.

This term we are holding enrolment interviews of prospective new students for 2020. We continue to be in a position of extreme roll pressure, therefore we are interviewing Preference students only at this time. Discernment around enrolment is transparent, with the application of our <u>Priority in Enrolment Procedures</u> occurring at the end of Term 3. It continues to be the wish of our Proprietor that we live out the intention of the Mission Sisters in providing Catholic education for those in our community who seek it. We will continue to work as hard as we can to aspire to achieving this goal for all in our community who desire Catholic education and qualify for it lawfully.

As always, so much to celebrate and acknowledge with the wonderful achievements of our Wāhine Toa throughout this newsletter. However, I would like to single out the incredible achievement of our Showquest troupe in winning the national competition. We are eagerly awaiting confirmation of when dignitaries will be visiting Sacred Heart to present this award. This student-led performance was impacting and moving, and a tribute to the life and gift of our angel Gabby Devine. We look forward to ensuring the success of the performance highlights and promotes further the wonderful work of Starlit Hope in bringing a little more kindness and a smile to those who need it the most.

### **Uniform Additions: Trousers and Shorts**

A small team of students have been working hard to introduce trousers and shorts into the Sacred Heart Girls' College uniform. The team leading this investigation have been; Ana Graham, Eve Hagenson and Lillian Brown with the help of Cath Leger.

This change has many reasons behind it. For example, a study has found that girls once entering secondary school are less likely to continue in sporting activities, and this has been put down to them then having to wear skirts, restricting their abilities. Also, not all students at the school feel secure wearing a skirt, and it is the school's duty to endeavor to make all students feel comfortable while they are learning. As it is, we are in 2019 and it is necessary that a modern approach is taken into consideration.

After over a year of hard work and a very thorough process we have selected a pair of trousers and a pair of shorts. The process started with a petition which collected over 500 signatures which told us that there was a good level of support to investigate it further. We then talked to our uniform supplier and looked at what was on offer. From this, a variety of pants and shorts were selected. We then asked our students what they thought through a survey. They told us that a more tailored look was preferred and that the pants should become part of the formal senior uniform.

With this information we narrowed the search and then asked our Year 10 students to make the final choice as they are at the end of their junior uniform wearing days and about to embark on their senior uniform.

We now have a pair of trousers and a pair of shorts ready for community feedback. We would like you to be part of the final decision. Can you please click on this <u>SURVEY LINK</u> and complete a very quick survey which will ask "Should these pants and shorts be included as additions to our school uniform?"



These are the pants; they are NZ made, have a smart tailored look, they are made of a navy hard wearing and easy care "poly wool", they have a zipped hidden side pocket, a wider waistband for comfort, a straight smart leg and a hidden coin pocket. The retail cost is likely to be around \$90.

These are the shorts; they are navy, and are constructed from a hardwearing material. The fit is relaxed and sits just above the knee. There are small notches at the side hem for a smart tailored look. There are side pockets but no back pockets. They look very smart when worn. They are likely to retail around \$50.

We would like to stress that these additions are **only** additions and will be **optional** items. If you and/or your daughter do not want to purchase a pair of trousers or shorts that is completely okay, your daughter can and will continue to be able to wear the skirt.

### **Attendance**

The best way to achieve at school is to be at school.

We recently shared the following table with some of our caregivers. It shows very clearly the cumulative effect of small amounts of time absent from school. It can also be applied to time spent "without purpose" on a device. It is worth thinking about and worth having ongoing conversations with your daughter.

On Thursday 15 August, we celebrated the Feast of the Assumption, one of only two remaining Holy Days of Obligation in the Catholic Church (the other one is Christmas Day). It is the patronal feast of the Catholic people in Aotearoa. On this day we recall the origins of

the Catholic Church in New Zealand. Bishop Jean Baptist Pompallier arrived from France to the Hokianga in 1838 with a group of Marist priests and brothers. He learned Te Reo Māori on his way to New Zealand and became fluent in the language. This enabled him to write Mō Maria. At Sacred Heart, we gathered as a school community to celebrate the assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into heaven at the end of her earthly life. Our student-led liturgy honoured Mary as someone who trusted completely in God and his plan for her. "Every time you are loving, kind, compassionate, faithful, trusting and courageous, you are like Mary. You help others to see Jesus in our world."

### **Receiving the Sacraments:**

Our chaplain, Ms Carole Tipler, is beginning to prepare students who wish to receive the Sacrament of Eucharist. # **NCEA Review Package**

The NCEA changes announced on Monday 13 May looked at the following:

- Wellbeing of students and teachers
- Inclusion and equity
- Curriculum coherence
- Pathways through and beyond school
- Credibility of the qualification



The elimination of fees will make a good contribution to improving equity for students nationwide. This will ensure that students get proper recognition for what they have achieved and are not deprived of that recognition by their families' inability to pay fees.

The shift to fewer and larger standards and a return to about half the standards being externally assessed will mean that all students will access the key knowledge and skills of the subjects they take. Currently, the excess of standards available in many subjects, most of these internally assessed, means that teachers can design courses to maximise credits earned rather than to ensure that all their students access the important knowledge of the subject. With less choice of standards, and standards that cover a broader scope, all students should access the core elements of the curriculum in future.

There are important improvements for Māori-medium education. New suites of standards for both English and Māori Medium will be created as part of the same process.

There will also be significant reductions in both teacher and student assessment workload, once the new standards have bedded in. Half the credits will be externally assessed. The external standard will be a different type of assessment, e.g. exam, an investigation, a portfolio, a performance, etc.

Resubmissions will only be allowed if they would get a student from Not Achieved to Achieved. Resubmissions are not the same as what we currently call Further Opportunities, which is where there is another assessment event or task that assesses the same standard, giving a student another shot at showing what they can do. These Further Opportunities will still be allowed for all grades, but, given the size of the new internal standards, it is likely that achievement of these will come from a series of learning opportunities from which the teacher will be able to judge the student's best level of achievement, rather than a specific assessment event that is a further opportunity. So, for example, in Science there might be a standard that is about scientific investigation, and students would do a few investigations across the year in different contexts. The grade would come from an overall judgement of what they had achieved in that area across the year. If you have further questions, contact the school office or me directly.



SHGC has, in the past, offered ICAS (International Competitions and Assessments for Schools) to students who wish to participate. This year, Leaders of Learning questioned the increased cost of this competition and reevaluated its usefulness to our students. It is administered by the University of New South Wales and the test questions are focussed on the Australian curriculum which does not always align with the New Zealand curriculum. This puts our students at an immediate disadvantage. Our Leaders of Learning are comfortable with other enrichment opportunities that are offered to our students through a variety of other means. We will therefore not be offering the ICAS competition to our students in 2019.

### **Science**

The WITT Taranaki Science and Technology Fair was held last week and once again Sacred Heart Girls' College had a large number of entries. We had prize winners across all the major categories and a special mention should go to **Olivia Pennington, Tessa Honeyfield** and **Nicayla Brophy** who took away multiple awards for their Scientific Investigations. Congratulations to all the girls who put in the effort to submit an entry and a big thanks to parents and the staff of the Science Department who had a hand in helping the girls prepare their entries. A

special thanks to Jane Sanfelieu and the Science Fair Committee for the work they

put in to ensuring that a successful event takes place.



### **Science**

The Wonder Project is Engineering New Zealand's free programme for schools, designed to get young Kiwis excited about science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM). During Term Two all Year 7 students participated in the Wonder Project Rocket Challenge. Students had an immersive

STEM experience by designing, building and launching a water rocket of their own with a little help from their teacher and a local STEM professional. ### **Practice Exams**

Practice Exams for senior students will be held in Week 8 and 9 (Thursday 12 September—Wednesday 18 September). The exams have been split over the weekend to give students the opportunity to rest, refresh and continue to revise in preparation for the Monday and Tuesday exams. These exams should be treated with importance. The results from the exams can be used as a Derived Grade and will help the student and their teacher to identify areas of strength and areas to work on in preparation for the end of year NCEA external exams.

A Derived Grade is a grade reported by a school based on pre-existing evidence. Students can apply for a derived grade if:

- they believe their preparation for, or performance in, an external exam was impaired, or
- they were unable to sit an exam for reasons beyond their control. Please take the time to talk to your daughter about preparing for the Practice Exams. Support her to prepare a study timetable with allocated times for study each day (between one and two hours of study each day is a good benchmark).

Although it seems early in the term, your daughter should start to go over her study notes and begin to work through past tests, quizzes and/or practice papers that have been handed out in class and/or returned to her during the term. Please contact your daughter's Manaaki Teacher or Dean regarding advice on this.

## **GEMS Conferences**

**Year 7-13 GEMS Conferences** — Student led three-way conversations are scheduled for the last week of this term. Refer to the front page of this newsletter for dates and times. This is an excellent opportunity for you and your daughter to discuss progress with her GEMS teacher. We encourage parents/caregivers to bring their daughters to the conferences so that progress information and goal setting can be discussed in a positive, inclusive and proactive way. Another focus of these conferences will be subject selection for 2020 for students in Years 9-12. The Award is open to all 14-24 year olds regardless

of their background, culture, physical ability, skills and interests and is the world's leading youth achievement award. Doing the Award is a personal challenge and not a competition against others; it pushes young people to their personal limits and recognises their achievements.

The Award has three levels, each progressively more challenging: Bronze; Silver and Gold. Participants are required to complete four sections at each level: Voluntary Service; Skills; Physical Recreation and Adventurous Journey.

Whether applying for tertiary study or about to enter the work force, The Award shows commitment and achievement, as well as dedication to a variety of activities. ### **Measles Information**



There has been a second case of measles confirmed in Taranaki, and parents and caregivers are being urged to be aware of the signs and symptoms of the illness.

Your child may have measles if they have not been vaccinated and have:

- A high fever
- A runny nose, sore red eyes or a cough
- A rash 3-5 days later which usually starts on the head and spreads down the body

If you think you or your child might have measles, you need to keep them home from school and away from public places and other people. Measles is highly contagious from before symptoms start until 5 days after the rash has appeared.

Please contact your doctor or **Healthline on 0800 611116 for more advice** and let your school or early childhood centre know that your child may have measles.

Vaccination is the best protection against measles.

Children are routinely immunised with the MMR vaccine at age 15 months and 4 years.

Children are considered 'fully immunised' against measles when they have two documented measles or MMR vaccinations.
