
Welcome to our September newsletter, and the final days of Term 3. It was a joy to celebrate Founder's Day on Wednesday with a wide range of stunning college events.

Over the last two days of term, parents and students have been attending GEMS (Goals Encourage Mana and Success) conferences. Tracking learning, reflecting on progress towards achieving goals and undertaking pathways planning, including subject selection, has been occurring and it has been incredible to see the number of caregivers attend, fully involved in meaningful conversation around what is the best course of action, and associated support mechanisms that might be required, for each individual. Your attendance is greatly appreciated and hugely beneficial, ensuring strong connections and shared understandings.

Our senior students have made the realisation that there is very little 'school time' left this year and will be finishing internal assessments and preparing for external examinations, with our Class of 2019 also adjusting to the fact that they will soon be transitioning into a new phase in their lives. Please keep an eye on our timeline of events so you can plan to join us for end of year events and celebrations. Please be reminded that these end of year celebrations creep up on us very quickly this calendar year, with Senior Prizegiving scheduled for the Tuesday evening directly following Labour Weekend.

The college continues to be in the position of extreme roll pressure. This term we have been conducting enrolment interviews of Preference students and are applying our Priority in Enrolment Procedure in discerning places in the college for 2020 presently. The Proprietor has decided that we have no choice other than to reapply to the Ministry of Education for a roll increase, and we are currently consulting with local schools regarding our position prior to lodging such an application.

Further in this newsletter, you will find information regarding the formation of a Health and Sexuality Curriculum Statement. This is a requirement of the Ministry of Education, which needs to be written in consultation with caregivers. In the drafting of our statement we have taken every care to ensure that we have adhered to the recommendations of the New Zealand Catholic Bishop's Council and the New Zealand Catholic Education Office (NZCEO). As part of our consultation with you, you will be emailed a copy of the draft statement, along with a survey link in the school holidays. You will also see on page 6, an invitation to attend face to face consultation on Monday the 14th of October, 7pm in the staffroom. Thank you to the PTFA for hosting this session.

Our building project is now well underway. Thank you for responding to messaging around safe access onto and through the school site. It continues to be important that vehicles only access the school site when absolutely necessary as there is very little room with single-lane access and a bottle-neck driveway. Please, please, please drop off and collect your daughters from the streets surrounding the college and avoid Pukaka Street altogether. Students are more than able to walk the short distance onto the school grounds and should be encouraged to use a raincoat or umbrella if it is raining. We are continually asking for your support in this and emphasise that it is a request made with the safety of our students being paramount. There is limited accessibility parking at the front of the administration area for those who require it.

All the very best for a rejuvenating and restful spring holiday break, and a special note of encouragement goes out to our Senior A Basketball side who continue their campaign with National

Secondary School Finals. I know they'll do Manawa Tapu proud!

Donations

A big thank you to the parents that have paid their daughter's school donation and to those parents paying theirs via AP or DD. It is not too late to start paying; even small amounts are greatly appreciated.

Being a Decile 8 State Integrated School, Sacred Heart Girls' College receives less funding from the Ministry of Education than the other state high schools in Taranaki. Sacred Heart is reliant on parents paying their daughter's school donation to account for the shortfall in our funding to ensure we provide high quality education in a high-quality, modern environment for your daughter.

The Proprietor's portion of the school donation goes to funding upgrades to the school property such as the turfing of the school courts this year and the building upgrade project that started in September, more on this below.

All donations paid to Sacred Heart qualify for a 33.33% tax rebate from the IRD, the school sends out these donation receipts after 31 March each year. If you have not received yours for 2019 please contact the school office and we will arrange for this to be sent to you.

Property

On September 9th 2019, the Proprietor of Sacred Heart began Stage One of a multi-stage project to upgrade the school buildings. Stage One gives the English department new modern classrooms, moving them to the block to the left of the driveway, just past the office. Stage One is expected to be complete in January 2020 in time for the start of Term 1.

Due to the construction, parking and vehicle movements will be extremely tight within the school and Pukaka Street. We ask that all parents please drop off their daughters on Paynters Ave or the surrounding streets. During construction (September 2019 to January 2020), please do not drive in to the school grounds or Pukaka Street during school hours, if it can be avoided. If your daughter is injured and needs to be dropped off outside the school building, please contact the office so we are aware of this. Student pick ups for appointments during the school day will continue as usual and parking for this is restricted to the limited parking outside the school office only.

We still have a number of caregivers dropping off or picking up their daughters from Pukaka Street, despite repeated App messages. Pukaka Street is a no stopping/parking zone from 8.15am to 4pm; this is monitored by the NPDC. Additionally, as the street is very narrow, cars turning around is a health and safety hazard to both students and staff trying to enter and exit the school. Please have whomever is transporting your daughter by car drop off and pick up from Paynters Ave, or the surrounding streets. Thank you.

Health Education



As part of our NZ Young Farmers sponsored "Bigger and Better" farming unit, 7M visited the Coogan's sheep farm MataRata Downs to experience first-hand "life on the farm".

During the visit, students got to ask plenty of questions, feed the new born lambs and watch Jake and George round up a mob of sheep.

We were also lucky enough to be caught up in the filming of a Country Calendar episode which will go to air on November 3rd.



I most definitely had the best day of my life visiting the Coogan family farm in Tarata. I repeated this phrase many times during this visit. Just ask Mr Taylor. The ride there and back was not that pleasant, but I survived. We arrived to the camera man and crew, with Sarah and Jarred Coogan close behind. We started off with a greeting to the farm with also some tips from the crew to NOT look at the camera, that was maybe the hardest part. We had a question volcano as students fired flaming rocks of questions at the farmers. They replied with floods of great answers. We sighed with great pleasure as we witnessed the everlasting cuteness of the clueless lambs. We went walking across the gravel road to the bull paddock to see the 4 bulls. Some of us headed over to throw hay, but then a near disaster happened. A block of hay landed on one of the bulls. It raced around to eat it off its back and George tried to herd them back up again. They ended up crashing into a heap and almost crashed into the wire fence, which would have bowled Mr Taylor and the director over! Then we had a rounding show as both George and Jake showed their sheepdog skills. As the show came to an end, we headed over to the growing native bush surrounding a flowing stream. Sarah informed us about the history and all the hard work put into this eye-catching bird hide-away. We walked further and saw a great river near the TOPEC site. Sarah told us she enjoyed swimming with her children there in the summer. As I heard that sentence, I wished it was summer, and I could almost feel the refreshing spring washing over me as I jumped into the glorious pool of water. I was snapped right back to the cloudy day of July, when the film crew asked if they could film a snippet of us walking into the entry of the fairy forest. We walked around, and we soon started our volcano of questions up again when we saw a mother sheep in the middle of birth. "she has just had one of the lambs now, the next is due to come." Sarah explained. I had the great experience of riding on the buggy with a classmate and Jarred. I had a blast as we sped down the track to the wool shed with the bus not seeable until we parked. George's dad greeted us when we arrived with a great lick on the hand with George copying his fatherly figure. We gathered inside the wool shed and had some kai, I also had the experience of being interviewed by a young farmers rep and after a small talk with the experts, we headed over to the orphan lambs to feed and have a cuddle with. We had a great half hour talking to Sarah's mum about the lambs and having a good time with the adorable little

creatures. As our time came to an end, we had a little chat about the helpers in the farming industry and beyond. As time passed, we handed over our handmade cards from this morning and said our goodbye with Manawa Tapu to just say thank you. We stepped onto the bus with a reflection of the time we spent a MataRata Downs in our eyes. We waved goodbye, and farewelled the land as we parted with the beautiful site of the Coogan family farm.

This term we introduced the Mates & Dates programme to our Year 11 students. Next term, Year 9 will start this programme. Years 10, 11 and 12 will start Mates & Dates in 2020. Mates & Dates is a programme about healthy relationships. It isn't just about dating, it's about all kinds of relationships, including family and friends.

The main idea behind Mates & Dates is to help our girls develop healthy relationships. We want to teach young people how to:

- identify unhealthy relationships
- have healthy relationships based on respect, negotiation and <u>consent</u>
- identify inappropriate behaviour
- get help if they, or someone they know, are in an unhealthy relationship
- safely intervene in situations that could lead to harm

Research tells us that 1 in 5 young women report unwanted sexual contact or being made to do unwanted sexual things. We want to equip our girls and help them prevent sexual violence, dating violence and give them the skills to identify unhealthy relationships. It's also about building on the strengths and skills our girls already have. Having Mates & Dates at our school will help our girls have healthier and happier relationships in and out of school.

Mates & Dates is a multi-year programme taught in Years 9-13. It is ACC funded and delivered by facilitators from Wellstop. The classroom teacher will also be in the session. Students have five 50 minute sessions over five weeks, that's one period a week. It builds year on year and ties in with the learning area of Health and Physical Education. We have aligned it with our Special Character. It's aimed at levels 4-8 of the New Zealand School Curriculum.
