Kia ora whanau

Welcome to our end of Term 2 newsletter. We have experienced tumultuous times in recent months as a nation in navigating the unchartered waters of a global pandemic. The social, emotional and financial implications of lockdown are something we will be continuing to experience and absorb for some time yet, and we have an obligation to remember that whilst we might be largely unaffected in comparison to populations the world-over from a health perspective, there are significant detrimental wellbeing and financial impacts on many in our own backyard.

Moving through the Alert-Levels conservatively, in a carefully considered way as a college community has been deliberate with a cleaned-down curriculum providing clarity and simplicity at a time when other aspects of young lives were somewhat topsy-turvy. I recently engaged in an hour-long Zoom meeting with the ERO team, who were interested in our management of the lockdown experience, and learnings we have taken from being thrown in to the unexpected.

As a result of our lockdown experience, and learnings that have been gleaned from gathering student, caregiver and teacher voice, we continue to make changes to our offerings. From the beginning of Term 3, our Year 13 cohort will experience Ako@Home one day a week for the remainder of the year. We look forward to the autonomy, independence and resilience that learners exhibited during lockdown spilling over into everyday life, and look forward to better preparing them for life beyond the school gates as they transition from school to 'real life' in just a few months' time. There will be slight timetable adjustments for learners from the beginning of Term 3 to assist with logistics.

Bringing back the joy of being a Sacred Heart girl is very much on the agenda, and we are looking forward to Founders' Day celebrations on the 14th of August, with Mass in the Events Centre at 10am, followed by House Singing at 2pm. Co-curricular and extracurricular activities will become more common-place, however we continue to be mindful

of the financial implications that Covid-19 has had on our community with an emphasis on no-cost or low-cost local offerings. Please find an updated Manawa Tapu – The Golden Rules poster on page 5 of this newsletter. Within, you will see adjustments to school finish times across Term 3, with a commitment to earlier finish times in the latter part of Term 3 in response to community voice.

In our previous newsletter, I mentioned Principal Sabbatical from August 17th until November 6th. During my absence, the college will be in very safe hands with the experienced Mr Murray taking the reigns as Acting Principal. Recently, our Leader of Learning Science, Mr Jeremy Taylor, was appointed to the leadership team for the duration of Principal Sabbatical and will fulfil the responsibilities currently held by Mr Murray as DP Senior school. Mr Taylor will be an integral member of the leadership team with a raft of leadership experience to draw from. I am delighted that Meg Nicholls will re-join our Science faculty from the beginning of Term 3 in a part time, fixed term capacity. Meg is well-known by our students, and a highly-respected teacher. We look forward to welcoming her back.

The college continues to be in a position of extreme roll pressure, as we are at the maximum number allowed for by law. Our Proprietor's Board and Board of Trustees remain resolute in doing all it can in meeting the obligations of our Integration Agreement in meeting the aspirations for Catholic education for those in our community who seek it and qualify for it. Most disappointingly, in recent times, we have had no choice other than to apply our Priority in Enrolment Procedures, and have been forced to decline entry to students who meet Preference Criteria. We are continuing to work with the Ministry of Education in presenting our desperate need for an increased Maximum Roll and are hopeful of an outcome before the end of this year. We are currently conducting enrolment interviews for Preference students whose families are seeking enrolment at Sacred Heart in 2021 in Year 7 and in Year 9. To be considered for enrolment in 2021 applications needed to be with us by the end of Term 2. Our Priority in Enrolment Procedure is rigorously applied in discerning enrolment. It has been a long term. Not only because of the 12 weeks we have been open, but because of the way in which the term has played out. Engaging with digital wellbeing and digital learning and teaching during lockdown led to a time of transition and adjustment in moving to a new normal once back at school with new protocols and limitations that have continued to morph and change. Now we have reached the end of this mammoth term, it is time to rest and rejuvenate in order that we return to the college ready for the challenges, excitement and joys that lay ahead, renewed by the spirit; te whakahou i te taha wairua.

Pentecost

On May 21st, Pentecost Sunday, the Church commemorated the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples as tongues of fire. Pentecost is especially important for the Diocese of Palmerston North, which is consecrated to the Holy Spirit

I te Wairua o te Kotahitanga United in the Spirit

The name Pentecost (Greek pentecoste, "fiftieth") originally referred to the Jewish Feast of Weeks which fell fifty days after Passover. This feast celebrated the first fruits of the harvest offered to God and also the giving of the Law to Moses. The early Church gave it Christian significance, rejoicing in the 'first fruits' and the 'new law' heralded by Christ's resurrection. Today we celebrate Pentecost as the conclusion of the Easter season, fifty



days after Easter Sunday. Conscious of the missionary zeal which galvanised the apostles into a united body, we often think of Pentecost as the birth of the Church.

Day of Prayer for Refugees and Migrants

The theme, "Where is your brother or sister?", was taken from Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* in which he challenges us not to look the other way, but to recognise our migrant brothers and sisters who are experiencing exploitation. This theme is particularly topical given the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Pope Francis acknowledges that the task of overcoming human exploitation takes "courage, patience and perseverance", but it is a task that we all must take part in. He challenges us "to open our eyes, to see the misery of those who are completely deprived of their dignity and their freedom, and to hear their cry for help."



The Catholic Church in New Zealand celebrated the diversity that migrants and refugees bring to our community on Sunday June 21st.

Geography

Year 13 Ako@Home Parent Help Sheet

Welcome to Year 13 Ako@Home which will occur every Wednesday for the rest of the year. Our Ako@Home programme is designed to be flexible and accommodating when it comes to your daughter's learning. This programme is designed to help transition your daughter to the next step.

At Sacred Heart Girls' College, we have a range of on-line platforms available to support your daughter's ongoing learning through 'AKO@HOME'. Our staff will use a range of communication methods including:









What is expected of your daughter?

She needs to follow the timetable. She does not need to wear uniform, but appropriate dress is expected for live lessons.

There will be no NCEA due dates on this day.

She may email her teachers throughout the day.

What if she is sick or has a work placement in Pathways?

She is not expected to work if she is sick. If she has a work placement or has a course, she needs to attend it.

What if my daughter does not have a device or has poor internet connection?

If she is not able to access the online resources, for whatever reason, please contact your daughter's teacher. There will be a designated room at school for Ako@Home, for those who need to be in school.

What about Elizabeth House students?

Year 13 Boarders will work in their rooms at Elizabeth House. Teaching staff will supervise them from an office in the Hostel especially designed for Ako@Home support.

Will teachers arrange tutorials or workshops at school on Wednesdays?

At this stage, no. However, as we grow Ako@Home this may be explored.

The following are reminders for our Year 13 students:

Some things to remember:

Check your email in the morning – this will be where you find notifications from your teachers, in the form of email, Teams and APP notifications

Follow your timetable for the day – we would recommend that you create a routine as you would normally have on a school day, a schedule that has regular breaks and study time in manageable chunks.

Find a good place to work – a space at home that is comfortable, where lighting is good and where you can work without distractions. You should work on a laptop or computer, remember that your phone is too small for long periods of time and not recommended as a learning tool.

Find a support person – many of us need someone that holds us accountable to deadlines. Perhaps one of your parents/caregivers might check to make sure you have a work plan. Alternatively, maybe you and another student in your class could check in with each other. For those of you who spend hours on games or social media, a support person will be essential to ensure good timetable habits with managing screen time.

Check you have the contact details for your Dean or GEMS teacher.

As a College we are committed to a safe, collaborative and supportive learning environment for all. We ask that you engage in respectful learning behaviour to ensure that we can all participate in a caring and connected online community.
