Kia ora whānau, welcome to our May newsletter

Traditionally May is a very busy month in the school calendar with a number of events and activities of significance and importance vying for room on the college's calendar of events. We also remember May as being the month of Mary, and we remember her great strength and sacrifice in saying yes to God's plan. We have also learned from the Mission Sisters the importance of the Feast of the Visitation to their charism, witnessed by the Head Girl Team in leading the college in better understanding the roles of both Mary and Elizabeth, and how we can emulate their communion with one another in our everyday lives. Thank you for the generous contributions to Women's Refuge that will contribute to meeting needs of these vulnerable members of our community. Thank you also to students who continue to honour the legacy of our angel, Gabby Devine, in support of the charity Starlit Hope. Encountering others in their moment of need, and generously giving of oneself in the doing of good works, quietly, is an example of being extraordinary, everyday missionaries.

We have held our annual Open Afternoon and have begun enrolment interviews for 2022. This term, we welcome to interview preference students who wish to join us in our boarding hostel, Elizabeth House, and throughout Term 3 we will interview prospective preference day students. We continue to experience significant roll pressure, despite our recent Maximum Roll Increase from the Ministry of Education. Thank you for your support in understanding that the Ministry of Education has determined NCEA Accord Teacher Only Days, the first of which we held last Friday. There were two areas for staff to focus on; Mātauranga Māori and changes to Literacy and Numeracy as co-requisites to NCEA. Thank you to college supporter, Maata Wharehoka, for joining us in support of our bourgeoning understanding of equitable access to education. There are further MoE-mandated Teacher Only Days on the horizon as the NCEA change package is rolled out. Following a review of our Ako@Home practices in lockdown last year, and our continuation of learning from home for Year 13, we have decided to re-instigate a day's independent learning a week for Year 13 students from the 16th of June until the end of Term 3. Year 12's will also be granted the occasional Ako@Home day. We value the opportunity for our students to be more autonomous in their learning and to practice skills that will be valuable to them in life beyond the school gates. Our on-line learning platform continues to be Microsoft Teams and teachers will be available to students for conferencing during timetabled periods. We also welcome students to be on-site should they proactively arrange to meet with their teachers or negotiate a suitable time to work in a practical subject. Please also note earlier school finish times four days a week from the week beginning 14th June.

Also under review has been the place of a school ball, given that the Covid-interrupted year that was, took the annual school ball off the agenda last year. School balls are constantly a source of concern with the risks associated often out-weighing the benefits. 
For Parents and Whānau—NCEA feedback for Ministry of Education






Nourish Catholic Character

Pentecost

The season of Easter concluded with the celebration of the feast of Pentecost on Sunday May 23rd. On Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles gathered in the upper room in Jerusalem; this event marks the beginning of the Church. Jesus fulfilled his promise to send to his disciples a helper, an Advocate, who would enable them to be his witnessers throughout the world. This same Holy Spirit is still with us. In the Gospel reading on Pentecost Sunday, we heard Jesus saying, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent



me, so I send you." We are called to bear witness to our faith by being the hands, the feet, the face and the voice of Jesus in our world.

May 24 was the sixth anniversary of the publication of Pope Francis' document *Laudato 'Si* and marked the conclusion of the special anniversary year to celebrate its release in 2015. In this document, "On Care for our Common Home", Pope Francis addresses issues on environmentalism, poverty, science and other topics such as urban planning, agricultural economics and biodiversity. He talks about our responsibility and need to care for our common home. Exercising "Stewardship" is caring for the gifts that God has given to us, including the environment, our own personal talents and other resources. We are *kaitiaki* – guardians of the earth. The integrity of the ecosystems which make up the earth is vital for our survival and for the wellbeing of future generations. Everything in creation is given for all people. Understanding our interdependence with all living creatures, we must use God's gifts responsibly to meet the needs of everyone, now and in the future.

"All of us can co-operate as instruments of God for the care of creation, each according to his or her own culture, experience, involvements and talents." Pope Francis. Laudato Si' 14.

At his general audience on 25 April 2018 at St Peter's in the Vatican, Pope Francis spoke about Baptism. 
