Kia ora whānau, welcome to our July newsletter and the end of Term 2.

Thank you and congratulations to every student who has Lived the Mission, and therefore the intent of the Mission Sisters, in being the best possible versions of themselves they could possibly be throughout Term 2. We Live the Mission through Ako when we take every opportunity to learn, we Live the Mission through Manaakitanga when we respect and love one another, just as Jesus loves us, and we Live the Mission through Wāhine Toa when we respect and love ourselves through being resilient, independent, and by making great decisions and doing the right thing. The majority of students at Manawa Tapu both understand our Mission and thrive in our environment.

Unfortunately, there has been a spate of disciplinary matters at the College in the latter part of this term which has been uncharacteristic and disappointing. We are a relational school, and when students make mistakes or exercise a lack of judgement, we are generally able to assist the young person in owning their poor decisions, learning from their mistakes and in taking responsibility for putting things right. This restorative, reconciliatory approach is the preferred method of owning behaviour, in righting wrongs and in healing hurts. However, when actions of a small minority of students are harmful, dangerous and/or set a poor example to oneself and others, we are left with no option other than to exercise punitive, formal disciplinary measures. Resultingly, there have been a number of formal Stand Down's from school and from our hostel, Elizabeth House in recent weeks. Thank you to parents who have fully supported the College and our position whilst they have accompanied their child through formal disciplinary processes.

We are not immune from the trend across Aotearoa New Zealand of young people taking up Vaping. We have learned that countless youths are addicted to Vape Juice, which in many cases contains a high percentage of nicotine. Whilst we are led to believe that Vaping causes less harm and encourages tobacco smokers to quit, it is hugely concerning that adolescents see Vaping as 'cool' and are taking it up to fit in with their peers. The health risks of Vaping are not yet fully understood, and the legislation in this country is struggling to keep up. It is incredibly concerning to learn of the huge number of young people who Vape, who buy Vapes and Vape Juice over the counter illegally, and who bring both to school and to our hostel for their own consumption, or for others'. We have been

educating our staff and our students, and are planning on leading a proactive student-led campaign to highlight the dangers and risks. Students and caregivers are reminded that under recent legislation, our College and our hostel are Smokefree and Vapefree environments, and we have adopted policy which allows for consequences should anyone be engaging in such.

Te Aho ō Ruahine

Our korowai, Te Aho ō Ruahine, has found her new home in our entrance foyer. Her name was gifted to us by the Kawana whānau, in consultation with iwi; thank you to Ruakere Hond for his wisdom. The name utilises the concept of 'aho' for the thread in the korowai, and it also means to shine. Ruahine connects to Marney Kawana's strong Taranaki links, and also is representative of a wise older woman leader. Our school pounamu, Te Ngākau Taua sits with Te Aho ō Ruahine, referencing the spiritual her that the korowai represents. The name also incorporates the Ngai Tahu term 'taua', which is better known as kuia across the rest of the motu. Our heart-shaped pounamu is literally from Te Wai Pounamu. We are so proud to have this taonga installed in our kura. Please be sure to come and have a close look at her whenever you might visit our foyer, she is beautiful.



We continue to be in the most uncomfortable position of not being able to offer enrolment to every family who might seek it for their child in 2022, and this also pertains to places in our hostel, Elizabeth House. We are currently offering Year 9 hostel positions and some Year 9 day student positions for 2022, and hold an active Wait List for each. Across Term 3 we will be interviewing prospective Year 7 day students, all of whom will need to hold a signed Preference Certificate for the purposes of entry to Sacred Heart, in order to be offered an interview. An interview does not guarantee enrolment. Due to continued roll pressure, the Board of Trustees, with the support of our Proprietor, the Mission College New Plymouth Trust Board, have been updating our Priority in Enrolment Procedures and will work with the Ministry of Education in adopting an Enrolment Scheme, all with the intent of attempting to meet the aspirations of our college community in offering quality Y7-13 girls' Catholic education to those who both aspire to and qualify for it.

We farewell and wish Mr Rob Evans all the very best as he takes Parental Leave for the remainder of the year, and are delighted that Mrs Felicity Paterson will be engaged with us full time until the end of 2021.



Vaping

I am sure that it will not be news to you that we have a nationwide problem with some rangatahi vaping. All schools in Aotearoa are legislated to be smoke-free and vape-free at all times. School management, our Board of Trustees, and Hostel Management must take all reasonably practicable steps to ensure that no person smokes or vapes on site. As a part of this, we are embarking on a programme of educating staff, students, parents, whānau to increase our knowledge and understanding of vaping and how we respond to this. We are making some environmental changes to discourage vaping. We are developing a student lead campaign and accessing support for students who have an addiction problem with vaping. Junior students complete a Health module on vaping. For students caught vaping or with vaping paraphernalia, this is treated as a serious breach of the behaviour expectations and is managed by the Senior Management Team.


Some students are indeed vaping at school and the hostel. Vaping is perceived as very cool, fun to be sneaky and a buzz by some students. It is also true that a small group of our students have a problem with vaping and may have a significant addiction. We know that many students are making a choice for themselves to stay away from vaping.

Vaping is a very complex issue being battled out between health, NZ Smokefree goals, and big tobacco with young people caught up in-between. To understand the issues, have a read of Nikki Macdonald's <u>stuff</u> article which provides a comprehensive examination of a range of perspectives. If you prefer to view your information, try the Netflix docu-series 'Broken' episode on Vaping which includes the voice of young people, health, and

national responses to this emerging issue. The Ministry of Health has some useful information <u>The facts of vaping | Vaping Facts</u> while <u>Don't Get Sucked In</u> is useful for adolescents to get info for themselves. Talk to your children, teens, tamariki, view some of the above information together, and seek help if concerned.

Periods are a fact of life for half the population. Period. Access to period products: Information for parents and whānau.

Periods are a normal part of life for half our population and no one should miss school because of their period. Young people can't always access the products they need to feel comfortable at school and sometimes they may simply get caught unprepared. Whatever the reason, free period products for young people who need them means that they don't have to miss school because of their period.

As parents and whānau, your young person's education and wellbeing is important to you. Providing period products is part of supporting their wellbeing. Students can better focus on their learning and know they can get what they need, when they need it, to manage their cycle.

We have signed our school up for this government initiative and have now received our first delivery of period products. These products are available in Manaaki classrooms (including homerooms for Year 7 and Year 8). Please note that we do not get a choice of brands, but we are supplied with pads and tampons in both regular and super. We will be ordering a small number of products regularly according to student demand. Students are encouraged to take only what they need and should not be stockpiling supplies.

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Openly Engage with Community

Mates & Dates is a multi-year programme taught in Years 9-13.

It is ACC funded and delivered by facilitators from RespectEd. The classroom teacher will also be in the session. Students have five 50-minute sessions over five weeks, that's one period a week. It builds year on year and ties in with the learning area of health and physical education. We have aligned it with our Special Character. It's

aimed at levels 4-8 of the New Zealand School Curriculum.

New Pathway Spaces

The new Pathways classrooms, offices and cafe opened on the first day of Term 2. Over the last few weeks, they have been furnished as our orders have arrived. With over 90 individual courses and options taking place in Pathways, spaces that support both independent and collaborative work are essential. The new spaces: a spacious classroom, cafe, computer suite and offices are working well. The Pathways classroom is named Hope, the computer suite is Charity, and the cafe is known as Cafe Foi (the French word for Faith).



The cafe is proving popular. We have over 30 girls currently on barista

courses, students who completed the course last year and trained baristas who work in cafes around town. The cafe space provides an opportunity for them to practice their coffee making but also other

essential employment skills such as customer service, human resources, procurement, stock control, cleaning up and marketing.







The classroom spaces accommodate a variety of learning styles and contexts with conventional desks and chairs, comfy chairs, bean bags and high tables with bar stools.

It is interesting to watch girls who are in more than one Pathways class. In one class, they will sit quietly doing their online Te Kura. When the class changes over, they will move to a different seating area, work on a different Pathways course or other classwork and engage more socially with their classmates. The girls did a superb job of writing short Pathways bios for our "Wall of Fame".
