## **Nourish Catholic Character**

### Years 8-10 Retreats—Pilgrims of Hope on a Journey of Faith

Over the past few weeks, our Year 8, 9, and 10 students have taken part in their annual retreats—special days set aside to step away from the usual routines of school life and focus on spiritual growth, reflection, and renewal.

But what is a retreat? It's a sacred opportunity to:

- Grow closer to God and deepen our faith.
- Become positive role models for ourselves and others.
- Reconnect with each other in a meaningful way—away from the distractions of social media.

This year's retreat theme was "Pilgrims of Hope", inspired by the upcoming Jubilee Year in the Catholic Church. The theme calls all Catholics to embark on a spiritual journey marked by faith, renewal, and solidarity—and our students embraced this call wholeheartedly.

We began each retreat with a special screening of the animated film *King of Kings* at Events Cinema. This beautiful portrayal of the life of Jesus—from His birth to His death—offered powerful lessons and sparked deep reflection.

Following the film, students went on a hikoi (journey) to St Joseph's Parish, where they joined the parish community for midday Mass. This was a moving experience that connected our students with the wider faith community.

In the afternoon, we shared kai, created 'freeze-frame' dramas based on Gospel passages from the movie, and lifted our voices in song. These creative and spiritual activities helped students encounter Christ in new and meaningful ways. It was a truly special day—one that allowed our young people to pause, reflect, and grow in their faith. At Manawa Tapu, we are proud to nurture students who are not only learners but also pilgrims of hope, walking together in faith and love.

### **Year 13 Mass**

Before stepping into their formal attire and celebrating their final year together, our Year 13 cohort took time to honour a cherished tradition—giving back to the Parish that has supported them throughout their journey. Held in the St Joseph's Parish Hall, Sunday 11 May, the Mass was a beautiful expression of gratitude and faith. Our students led the liturgy with reverence and joy, taking on roles such as reading, singing, leading the Prayers of the Faithful, taking up the Offertory, and ministering the Eucharist. Their leadership was a testament to the spiritual maturity and commitment they have developed during their time at Manawa Tapu.

We were blessed to have **Fr Sobin** preside over the Mass. His warm and thoughtful presence brought a deep sense of community to the celebration. A particularly special moment was when **Sinead O'Sullivan**, one of our Year 13 students, received her First Holy Communion—a sacred milestone shared with her peers and parish whānau.

At the conclusion of the Mass, **Fr Sobin** offered a special blessing for the Year 13 students, acknowledging their journey and praying for their future. It was especially moving to see the FDMC boys join us for the blessing, highlighting the unity and shared faith between our Catholic schools.

At Manawa Tapu, we are truly blessed to have students who are not only leaders in learning but also faithful servants of Jesus Christ. This Mass was a powerful reminder of the strength of our Catholic character and the spirit of service that lives in our young people.



### O'Shea Shield

Recently, we had the privilege of taking a team of 16 passionate and talented students to the prestigious O'Shea Shield competition, hosted this year at Cullinane College in Whanganui.

Running since 1946, the O'Shea Shield is one of New Zealand's oldest and most respected intercollegiate competitions. Each year, it brings together around 300 students from 17 Catholic secondary schools across the **Wellington Archdiocese** and **Palmerston North Diocese**. The event is a vibrant celebration of Catholic identity, youth talent, and community spirit.

The competition features eight categories that reflect our Catholic Special Character:

- Junior, Senior, Impromptu, and Prepared Speech
- Oratory
- Debating
- Religious Questions
- Drama

Scripture Reading (in both Te Reo Māori and English)

Our students represented the school with pride, grace, and excellence. We are thrilled to share some outstanding achievements:

Macy Stuck placed First in the Junior Prepared Speech section and was awarded the O'Shea Shield Vaughan Family Cup.

## **Nourish Catholic Character**



### Pasifika visit to Len Lye



### **World Vision Youth Conference**

Attending the World Vision Youth Conference in Lower Hutt was an unforgettable and inspiring experience. The event brought together passionate young leaders from across the North Island. It was uplifting to be surrounded by other young people who care about global issues and want to make a difference. The quote presented at the conference "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." made a great impact on our knowledge of leadership. It allowed us to understand that the foundation of change is teamwork and endurance, it also made us aware that it is never too late to start.

During the event, we heard from several powerful speakers who shared their stories. One that stood out was Abbas Nazari, who spoke about his experiences as a refugee from Afghanistan in 2001. His story taught us that leadership isn't about having a title or power, it's about taking action and helping others.

World Vision introduced the 40 Hour Challenge to us, the challenge to go offline for 40 hours and raise money for people suffering from hunger in the Solomon Islands due to the impact of climate change. Polyne is a 9 year-old girl who lives in the Solomon Islands. Polyne doesn't have enough access to food because the land around her that should be growing food is constantly being covered in silt due to storms, flooding and rising sea levels. It made us aware of how privileged we are to have enough to eat and adequate homes to live in.

Seeing the work World Vision's youth ambassadors have done during their trip to the Solomon Islands inspired us. It showed

us how we can become activists and actually create positive change even though we are young. The conference taught us a lot about leadership, teamwork, and the importance of speaking up for what you believe in.

Huge thanks to Mrs Avery and Mrs Rangiwahia who accompanied us. The conference is definitely worthy for those who are passionate about campaigning for global issues as well as future leaders.




