In Board news, the current Board has now put together a Draft Strategic Plan for 2026 – 2028. This plan does not capture everything we are working on at Manawa Tapu, but sets our vision and aspirational goals for the next three years. Please give us feedback on the draft plan via the survey that has been emailed to you, by Monday 25 August. The new Board will take office in September and will then finalise the Strategic Plan before the end of the year.

On a more unusual note, we have had considerable issues with magpies down on our bottom field. This was an issue at this time of year last year too. Please note that we have been working closely with the Council on this issue and have been following their advice. We cannot shoot magpies at school but have been setting traps. We are also advised to avoid behaviour that provokes or harasses the magpies and should stay calm and quiet. Our students should not be on the bottom field without a staff member.

The Feast of the Assumption

This is a holy day of obligation in the Catholic calendar in Aotearoa, New Zealand. It commemorates the belief that the Virgin Mary, the mother of Jesus, was assumed body and soul into heaven at the end of her earthly life.

Honouring Euphrasie Barbier – Our Foundress

We held our whole school Mass at St Joseph's Church, we remembered Euphrasie Barbier (1829–1893), the founder of the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions. In 1884, the Sisters established a convent school with a boarding hostel in New Plymouth, near where St Joseph's Church now stands. The school welcomed both primary and secondary students. In 1960, it moved to Pukaka Street and became Sacred Heart Girls' College. As a school, we are proud to carry on Euphrasie's legacy—educating young people while embracing the Gospel values, communion, contemplation and mission.

A Special Journey for Our Māori Students

From the 23rd to the 24th of July, our Māori students were warmly welcomed to Muru Raupatu Marae for a noho marae experience that was both educational and deeply meaningful. This overnight stay provided a valuable opportunity for students to connect with each other, their heritage, and the local whenua.

One of the key parts of the noho was beginning our learning journey about the school korowai, Te Aho o Ruahine. We explored the story behind its conception and creation, gaining insight into its significance. This was just the beginning of our journey to understand how the values and meaning woven into the korowai can be incorporated into our everyday life at school.

We were privileged to be guided by Damon Ritai, who was instrumental in organising this noho. He also led us on a hīkoi around significant sites of Puketapu Hapū, sharing his incredible depth of knowledge and passion for our local history and whakapapa. His korero brought the whenua to life and deepened our appreciation for those who came before us.





Our heartfelt thanks also go to our beloved Kui, Rita Rukuwai, who has been a constant guiding light — not only throughout this noho, but in all things Māori within our kura. Her wisdom, mana, and aroha continue to inspire and support us all.

We also want to acknowledge our amazing parent supporters, whose tautoko made this noho possible. A very special mention goes to Colleen Tuuta, who arrived early to prepare breakfast and who has been unwavering in her support for all that we do. Her generosity and commitment were felt by all and helped make the noho truly special.

Alongside the learning and reflection, the noho was filled with moments of laughter, connection, and shared experiences. Delicious kai, warm korero, and whakawhanaungatanga helped strengthen the bonds between us all, creating memories that we will carry with us for years to come. We are looking forward to the next noho already!

On a cool Sunday 20 July, seven Year 12 students, Ms Ashton and Mr McA (and Kevin Whio) were dropped off in Eastern Taranaki beyond Makahu School by Mr Haylock so we could head into the bush on the Matemateaonga Track. The team needed to complete their Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award Adventurous Activity requiring two nights in the wilderness.

Day one was a steady 2 hr walk to Omaru Hut, an 8 bunk single room facility with resident outside goat and kid that were keen to make friends with all.


Day two and everyone headed further east along the Matemateaonga range on a 13.3km trek towards Pouri Hut.



Stopping at the 8.6km point, packs were left on the main track while the team climbed 1.5 hrs return to the 732m summit of Whakaihuwaka (made like the prow of the canoe) Mt Humphries. From the top of this trig point we all got magnificent unobstructed views of the snow capped Taranaki Maunga, Tongariro, Ngaruhoe and Ruapehu as well as sweeping views of the Whanganui National Park. Heading off from the main track again, the team got to the 12 bunk Pouri Hut just on dark at around 5:30pm. A pretty cool evening at Pouri as firelighting was unsuccessful with wet scraps of wood.

Day 3 and we were treated to amazing views of Tongariro National Park as the sun rose on a frosty Tuesday morning. Once good to go we started the big 19km march back along the Matemateaonga Track towards Omaru Hut and our pickup point on Kohi Saddle east of Makahu. Mr Haylock met us between Kohi and Omaru as we headed along the track and after jogging off to check out Omaru

Hut, returned to accompany all to our School Van.





Ms Ashton and I would really like to highlight what a great group we had the pleasure to spend considerable time with July 20 - 22 in the Matemateaonga.

The Team all interacted positively with great support for each other and Heather and I. Fantastic!
